1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Lady Keane College is affiliated to the North- Eastern Hill University. As the college is affiliated, the affiliating university proposes the curriculum, however, the following action plan is designed and fostered by the institution for its effective implementation. At the beginning of the academic year, the Principal along with the calendar committee prepares the college calendar for the year and convenes meeting with all teachers and staff of the college to discuss on the planned calendar and relevant issues. A meeting with the Heads of the Department is also convened to discuss the measures to be taken for effective implementation of the curriculum designed by the University. Based on the number of teaching days available in the academic year, the Heads of the Department are advised to prepare teaching schedules. The Principal also convenes meetings with the concerned Head of the Department along with its faculty members where proposed plans pertaining to the Department are brought forward, also problems and issues are discussed and resolved. In turn, the Heads of the respective Departments convene meetings with the teachers of the

Departments to discuss distribution of the syllabus and request the members to prepare the teaching schedules/lessons plan based on the teaching days available for the semester. The coverage of syllabus is reviewed by the respective Heads of Departments at regular intervals .In the eventuality that the syllabus may not be completed within the stipulated time frame, special classes are arranged by the teachers after the regular classes. Apart from this, the College has strategized ways and means to strengthen the teaching-learning process in the following ways: • Adopting new and innovative teaching techniques such as group discussion, case studies, projects, video tutorials in addition to the traditional lecture method to get the students actively involved in the teaching learning processes. • Guest lectures, seminars, Industrial visits and training programmes to supplement the curricular inputs.

Student mentoring is conducted with the aim of encouraging and motivating students to perform well not only in academics but in social, moral and emotional aspects as well. Faculty members of the departments are assigned to be the mentors the students. Classes are arranged separately for the morning section (Arts), day section (Arts) and Science stream. For classes where there are huge numbers of students, more than one mentor is assigned. The mentors are entrusted with the task of monitoring the attendance and academic progress of the students. At the beginning of the academic session, the mentors inform mentees about institutional goals and mission, the facilities available and the regulations of the affiliating university. The mentor maintains the record of their class attendance, classperformance and academic progress. Both formal and informal mentoring is followed. Teachers who were assigned to take mentoring classes, covered the areas such as Career, Ethics, Moral values, Leadership, Social and Stress Disorder, Inner Peace and Tolerance. In addition to the allotted classes for Mentoring and Value Education, all the teachers are involved in mentoring the students on a one to one basis

The Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system at the institutional level is being carried out as per the rules and regulations prescribed by the University to affiliated colleges. Continuous Internal Evaluation is mainly done through centralised internal tests and assignments. To ensure smooth functioning of internal evaluation, the college conducts centralised tests for all subjects and assignments based on the topics given by the departments concerned are compulsory. The departments also conduct the following activities to assess the academic performances of the students. Class Tests Departments conducts class tests for students after completion of a chapter or a topic and on the basis of their performances, feedback is given. Departmental Seminars/ Group Presentations Departmental Seminars and Group presentations are conducted to assess the performance of students in a group. Project Works Project works are carried out by few Departments as part of the evaluation process. Remedial Classes Remedial classes are conducted for students who needed help to improve their academic performances. Library Sessions Teachers encourage students to visit libraries. The college gives incentives to students who regularly use the library resources as an encouragement and motivation for others. Discussions Previous years question papers are discussed on a regular basis. Book Reviews Department of History encourages students to carry out book reviews. Group Discussions Group Discussions forms an essential part of internal evaluation in the departments. Classroom and Laboratory Sessions All Science Departments and BTTM carry out Classroom and Laboratory/Hands on sessions.

The College has an established systems and procedures for maintaining different infrastructural facilities like Laboratory, Library, Sports Complex, Classrooms etc. The College has an Infrastructure Committee, Technical Support, and Nontechnical support staff which see to the overall maintenance and utilization of the infrastructural needs of the institution. The College has an Estate Officer for the overall up keep and maintenance of the campus. Repair and maintenance work is done in and around the Campus whenever the need arises. Such matters whenever reported is attended by the Estate officer to assess the nature of work involved and required to be carried out. Matters related to such works is handled and taken care by the Estate Officer in consultation with the Infrastructure Committee. In case of minor repair work, the Committee through the Estate officer get the necessary work done. In case the nature of the work is major or demands/involves up gradation of the existing infrastructural facilities the matter goes to the Governing Body of the college through the Building Committee. There are support staffs viz. Laboratory Assistants , Laboratory technician, licensed electrician, Cleaning Staffs, Gardener, Security guards etc, who are responsible for the daily maintenance and upkeep of the campus infrastructures. The duty of the cleaning staffs and gardener is to maintain Cleanliness, beauty, and greenery of the campus. To ensure safety

and security in the campus CCTV cameras are installed at strategic locations. The College has also out sourced security guards to keep vigil of the entire campus 24x7. The Head of the Departments and faculty of the Departments are responsible to attend to the requirements of the Departments including laboratory. The Laboratory Assistants is entrusted with the duty of maintenance of the equipment. They are also trained to make small repairs whenever the need arises. In case of major repair work, the college sends for technical experts or sends the equipment to the authorised service centre. In order to provide a good and functional Library the Institution has a Library Committee. The committee convenes meetings regularly to address to the needs of the library. The Library also provides a suggestion cum complaint box in order to get the feedback of the users to function more effectively and to be user friendly. Binding of old and worn out books are done Periodically. Weeding of books is done once in four or five years in consultation with the respective departments. The computer systems of the College are managed and maintained inhouse by the department of Computer Science. The college is fully equipped to address the maintenance of sensitive equipment through the use of UPS. The College has installed a transformer to meet with the increasing power consumption of the Institution. To ensure constant supply of water provision is made for the supply of clean and pure drinking water from ground sources. There is an established linkage between the College and National Academic Body IAPT in which the College is made a permanent centre for the National Level Examinations Viz. NGPE

5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

6.1 - Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

The Head of the Department sees that the classes are taken and ensures completion of the syllabus within the stipulated time. In case of vacancy due to leave, the concerned head of the department requests for the appointment of teachers on adhoc basis. The college organizes talks, seminars and workshops to widen the knowledge base of the faculty and students in emerging fields related to the curriculum and contemporary issues. Students are encouraged to take part in departmental seminars and field trips. The College has partially implemented College Management System. At the highest level of administration is the Governing Body duly approved by the Government of Meghalaya. The Governing Body is composed of representatives from NorthEastern Hill University, Government of Meghalaya, Teachers and Parents. The President of the Governing Body is directly appointed by the Government of Meghalaya while the Principal is the Secretary. The Governing Body is totally responsible for the smooth functioning of both the academic and administrative sections. The Principal monitors the day to day functioning of the college. The Principal and the Vice Principal see to the general discipline, smooth functioning of the administrative section, the financial resource management and all matters pertaining to the development and growth of the college. The IQAC plays an active role in identifying the areas where the students will be most benefitted. After identifying the areas, the matter is then taken up to the Governing Body for necessary approval. The IQAC monitors and evaluate plans and policies of the institution for effective implementation and improvement. Staff Meeting is held at the beginning and before the end of every academic session. Every teacher volunteers to take charge of the various committees during the year. Some of the committees are IQAC, Steering Committee, Examination Cell, Admission Committee, Office coordination Committee, Sanctioning Committee, Purchase Committee, Infrastructure Committee, etc. Meetings of the Principal with the heads of the departments are held to ensure smooth functioning and running of classes, arranging remedial classes and completion of courses. Separate meetings of the Principal are held with the nonteaching staff of the college. The Office Coordination Committee sees to the smooth functioning of the office. To contribute towards the improvement and development of the College, the PTA and the Alumni Association were formed and annual general meetings were held once a year. Students' Council are elected by secret ballot. The election is conducted by the Teachers' in charge of Students' Cell. It has a General Secretary, Assistant General Secretary, Secretaries and Assistant Secretaries in charge for the different activities/ cells/ committees. The Students' Council is responsible for all matters concerning the students' discipline, grievances and general wellbeing. Students are encouraged to take up leadership roles. Its term is only one year. Every class nominates a representative as executive member to the council.

The institution regularly conducts and organizes winter and summer schools, workshops, training programmes, seminars, talks etc. emphasizing on the contribution and importance of research towards the community development and encourages the youth students to pursue higher education and contribute to the society through research programmes. Library, ICT and Physical The library has different sections like Infrastructure / Instrumentation reading rooms, reference section, lending section, esection and a question bank. The library adds new books regularly and subscribes newspapers, magazines and journals. The institution is a member of the National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content (NLIST). The Institution encourages the use of technology by providing necessary infrastructure like computers with internet facilities by which Open Educational Resources can be downloaded and used for the teachinglearning purposes. The innovative approaches like the use of LCD projectors, ICT for academic and administrative leadership and Interactive boards are extensively used in classroom teaching. Administration is decentralised and Human Resource Management managed by various committees comprising of teaching and nonteaching staff. New recruitment is done through the process of advertisement in the newspapers and candidates are selected after a written examination and personal interview. The attendance of the office staff is maintained in both register and biometric punching machine. To ensure the smooth functioning of work, computerisation with internet connection has been provided for the entire office. College posts are created to meet the requirements of the Institute. The college has an efficient accounts section which monitors all financial transactions. As the college is a deficit college, its main sources of income are through students' contribution in the form of admission, monthly and annual fees and through financial aids from the UGC, DBT, DPR, NEC and from the state government in the form of grantinaid for the salary component of the employees. The tuition fees collected from the students are shared between the college and the state government at the ratio of 40:60. The accounts of the College are internally audited annually by a Chartered Accountant Firm appointed by the College. The external audit is usually done by the Examiner of the Local Accounts, Government of Meghalaya every 4 years. The institution is yet to complete the external audit as it is under process for the financial year 20112012 till 20172018. Whenever the various funding agencies offers applications/proposals for funding under various schemes the Principal of the college is very proactive and meticulously applies for the same. Audited statements along with the Utilization Certificates duly prepared by an authorized auditor are sent to the funding agency.

7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

Lady Keane College is one of the oldest institutions for higher education for girls in the NorthEast Region of India. The vision of the founding fathers was to provide a safe and comfortable environment for young girls to be educated and to ultimately mature into responsible adults. A feature that has served to attract students to this institution is the presence of hostel facilities in the college campus. In fact, Lady Keane College, was the only girls college, until a few years ago, with a provision of hostel accommodation for its students. This is a distinctive and unique feature that has succeeded in attracting eager young students from all over the country and abroad. We now have students from our neighbouring countries viz. Bhutan, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka residing in our hostel accomodation. The College hostel can accommodate upto 275 students. The junior students are accommodated in a room with five beds and the seniors in a room with three beds, per room and international students get their own rooms. The hostel girls are placed under the supervision and care of a full - time warden and her assistants. Efforts have been made to provide balanced and wellplanned meals for the residents. It is gratifying to note that till date no complaints or grievances have been received regarding the quality of the meals provided. The menu is also changed regularly to provide variety and appeal to the students. No hostel can function smoothly without the provision of a regular supply of safe drinking water and tap water for meeting daily requirements. The management has implemented various eco friendly measures to meet the demand. The Rain Water Harvesting System is an innovative measure taken by our college. This measure has contributed tremendously towards the alleviation of water shortage that is a prominent problem in the city of Shillong. Another important and striking feature of the girl's hostel is the availability of solar energy systems installations. The altitude of Shillong and its cold climate makes it a necessity for the need of the availability of hot water for the girls and this need has been met through the installation of solar energy heating systems in the hostel. The Solar Photovoltaic Energy system is utilized and a number of CFL bulbs in the hostel are fuelled by solar power. This commendable feature has also solved many problems arising from energy demand and has resulted in the smooth operation of the facility on a daily basis. The alternative source of renewable energy has reduced the monthly consumption of hydroelectricity in the hostel. The hostel residents have access to a wellequipped gymnasium, a covered basketball court a tennis court and a volleyball court. Yoga and karate classes are organised and have many participants from the hostellers. A medical health unit is available in the college campus and the girls can access it during working hours. The unit has a visiting doctor and a full - time nurse along with attendants.
