One Nation One Election was organized on 29 March 2025 at K.L. Bajoria College. The main aim was to spread awareness among students.

One Nation, One Election is a proposal in India to hold elections for the Lok Sabha and all state Legislative Assemblies at the same time, instead of conducting them separately at different times. General elections for Lok Sabha are held every five years, if a government falls early, mid-term elections may be held.
